From the Camp near Trave, September 22.  
**C**HIVAS has surrendered after a Siege of 3 Days: 1300 Prisoners and 13 Cannon with Provisions for the whole Army, were taken in it. The 20th we besieg'd Novare, and about 10 in the Morning 2 Cannon shot were fir'd, whereupon the Inhabitants forc'd the Governour to surrender according to the Capitulation 500 Men march'd out with all their Arms, but most of them took on in our Service. To Day we came hither.

From the Camp near Cusano, September 25.  
 The 24th the Army broke up again, and march'd along the Canal towards Milan. To day the Magistrats of that City, in their Formalities, came to present the Keys of their Town to Prince Eugene.

 From the Duke of Orleans's Camp at Oulx, September 24th.

We have Advice that the Enemy have taken the Town and Castle of Casal by Surprize: The Story is thus related. Colonel Paul Diack, who on the 7th Instant when the Battle was fought before Turin, deserted to the Enemy with seventy Hussars of the Regiment that he commanded in our Service, told Prince Eugene some Days after, that when he took Service in the Troops of the two Crowns, he propos'd to himself to seek an Occasion to do the Emperor some acceptable Piece of Service, and that he believed he had now a fair Opportunity of doing it by a Project he had form'd to put Casal into the Hands of the Duke of Savoy. Hereupon Prince Eugene trusting him with the command of a Detachment of Horse, he cloath'd some of his Detachment of Germans with the Mounting of our 70 Hussars, and with a French Standard advanced to Casal, where he had lately been Garrisoned with our Hussars; it not being known he had deserted to the Enemy, he was readily admitted into the Town, it being believ'd he was come to Reinforce the Garrison: He attacked the said Garrison, which consisting of three Battallions, made great Resistance, but at last retir'd into the Castle, where having neither Provisions nor Ammunition, they were forced to yield themselves Prisoners of War.

From the Duke of Savoy's Camp at San Germano, near Verceelli, September 17th.  
 Trino and Crescentino, have surrendered to

us after the Example of Chivas. The Castle of Ivrea and the Fort of Bar have likewise surrendered; and the Baron de St. Remy is Master of the Valley of Aoste.

From the Leiden Gazette, dated October 7.

Milan, September 25.  
 Prince Eugene of Savoy advancing Yesterday with his Army within a League of this Capital, presently sent a Trumpet to summon it. Those that were upon Guard at the Gate by which he entered, as also on the Bastions, receiv'd him with loud Acclamations of *Long live the Emperor and King Charles III.* And had those two Monarchs themselves come, they could hardly have receiv'd more Honour than this Trumpet; for the People flock'd in Crowds about him, and gave unfeign'd Demonstrations of their extreme Joy for his coming, and for his inviting them to submit themselves to their lawful Sovereign. Our Magistrats seeing this, assembled extraordinarily in the Town House, and in the Evening deputed the Syndic and 7 others of the City Council to Prince Eugene, to make their Submission to him, and present him the Keys of the City. His Highness is expected to make his Entry to Day, or at least a Detachment of his Troops to take Possession of the City, and to attack the Castle in Case it will not voluntarily submit. We have Advice that Mortare has surrendered to Prince Eugene's Troops; and 'tis talk'd General Thaurin with a Detachment has possess'd himself of Pavia. The Prince of Vaudemont is retir'd with his Family and Effects to Pizighitone. Count Medavi is there likewise; and the Troops he commands are still in the Cremonenze, the Report of their Arrival at Abgrassio proving false. P.S. This Moment the Castle of this Capital of Milan offer'd to capitulate.

From the Paris Letter, dated October 4.

We hear that the Prince of Vaudemont having withdrawn the Garrisons of the Places of Milan, has put into the Castle of the Capital of that Dutchy 5 Battallions of French under M. de S. Pater, with Provisions and Ammunition necessary for a long Defence, is retir'd to Pizighitone on the Adda, and in Conjunction with the Count de Medavi pretends to defend the Passage of that River, and preserve the Cremonenze and the Mantuan, till the King's Army is in a Condition to re-enter Piemont.

Rotterdam, October 8th.

A Violent Storm happened at Sea, the Scots Fleet was in great Danger, Captain John Broun



hath lost his Ship, ten Seamen and five Passengers: Himself, two Seamen, and thirteen Passengers were saved upon the Splits of the Ship. Thomas Airs Ship belonging to Borrowstounness Foundered at Sea. There is still five Ships wanting of the Fleet, but we hope they are got safe in to the Gorie.

London, October 3d.

Collonel Moor of the Foot-Guards is come Express from the Duke of Marlborough; and gone after the Queen to Newmarket: What he brings is not known, but the Rumour is, that his Grace has given part of the French Army a Brush; Which (if true) by our next, we shall know more of it.

EDINBURGH, October 9.

By a privat Letter from London dated the 3d Instant, we have Account, that Collonel Moor arriv'd Express from Flanders, with the News, that the Duke of Marlborough, with the Confederate Army under his Command, Attack'd the French Army under the Command of the Duke de Vendosme in their Trenches, upon the River Mechin, intirely Defeat them, Killed 16000 on the Spot, took 14000 Prisoners, 90 Piece of Brass Cannon, 120 Standards, and all their Baggage.

The Number of those deceast within this City, and buried within the Gray-frier Church-yard last Week, are 11, Decreased 4.
